

BIRCA ANNUAL REPORT 2025



2025 has again been an exciting year for BIRCA with a very full program of artists almost every week. We have received 2-year funding of DKK 400,000 per year from the Danish Arts Foundation under the title **Laboratory and archiving within new ecological performing arts**. We hosted **BIRCA Kids** for the sixth year in a row, this year with 3 weeks dedicated to testing different constellations, and we have now entered a phase where the need for experience-gathering regarding learning and methods has arisen. This year, we chose to replace the past years' BIRCA Women residencies with a new format, **BIRCA eco MATTER**, focusing on ecology and materiality with international outreach. We tested yet another new concept with **BIRCA Senior**, aimed at Danish performing artists aged 50+. We started the second year of our Creative Europe funding for the **Island Connect project**, which has received 3-year support with a total of 7 European island partners. We carried out the established **Artistic Residency** format and the developing **Islander Focus** at BIRCA and sent an artist to the **Co-creation** format in Mallorca. All residencies had open calls with many applications. BIRCA eco MATTER alone attracted 230.

In total, we have hosted 11 weeks of funded residencies at BIRCA and 2 weeks on a Turkish island. In addition, we have provided space for residencies for **DDSKS/Laura Navndrup Black and 10 students from the Master's programs Dance & Participation and Choreography**, the **Sea Stories** project in the Nordic region, the **iCoDaCo project** with Cunts Collective as leader, **Pipaluk** with contact impro, and the **Scáthach** project with **Tina Robinson**.

Finally, this year we had a large program during the Bornholm Culture Week with 6 different performances and a premiere of a documentary film about fishing on Bornholm – with a total of 19 artists and 3 children in action and with 204 participants. One of the performances was part of the European project **(M)others on tour** with support from Perform Europe.

In total, 78 performing artists (of whom 42 are Danish), 18 children, and 10 other guests stayed at BIRCA in 2025. We have had 6 presentations at BIRCA with 46 audience members in the residency program, plus 13 presentations for 204 people during Culture Week. This year, we have also seen a diverse representation of artists, including children and seniors, gender diversity, and we have once again experienced great diversity in working fields and methods. We have increased our focus on curating and developing themed residencies, inspired by and in collaboration with some of the Danish artists closest to us. These artists have been invited in as consultants for individual residencies, and have also been given space for development.

We have continued the ecological perspective and expanded it by incorporating archiving as part of the practice, a perspective that will be included in future Island Connect projects. We remain aware of our CO2 footprint but must balance this with the desire to work internationally.

BIRCA Eco MATTER was co-hosted with Tora Balslev, who opened the residency with a joint workshop in BIRCA's fields and forest.

ISLAND CONNECT

This year, we hosted 2 Island Connect residencies at BIRCA, and we contributed with one participant to the joint Co-creation residency. It was the second year of a new round with support from Creative Europe. Partners, in addition to BIRCA, include: Domino/Croatia, CINE/Mallorca, IACC/Ireland, LAV/Tenerife, Sagdenia Teatro/Sardinia, and Theatre Alibi/Corsica. The project, besides creating working spaces for performing artists, focuses on qualities of island culture through explorations of island identity. All selected artists participated in a joint Springlab in April with all selected Island Connect artists and partners in Tenerife, where they were introduced to local artists from the island and had the opportunity to discuss island culture while forming networks across the board.

Artistic Residency at BIRCA June 16-29

This year's Island Connect residency focused on trees. Work was done on vertical dance in the oak trees in BIRCA's forest in the project "Endurance" and the relationship between horizontal and vertical was explored. A research question was also posed: Laetitia set out to investigate if she could get Syd to prove that she could talk to trees in the project "Sylvia, Prouver et Eprouver" – along the way they gave up, Laetitia surrendered to her intuition and wrote "Laetitia's Unfinished Science book" in parallel, arguing for the existence of polyphonic and symphonic truths.

Thank you for giving space to "Endurance" a new project is always a risk, and it is amazing how BIRCA can hold uncertainties, slowness, speculations and proposals with so much warmth and acceptance - Tanya

Islander Focus 4. - 17. August

We follow the dream tracks of the elders Through the island's chakra, via the sun temple to the Crystal Lake. We ask ourselves what the sea has to tell and what gifts it gives. We listen. Making kinship.

Islander Focus is an investigative residency format where artists with different backgrounds participate with a focus on island identity. This year, we collaborated with two new Nordic partners who will be part of the future network: DACE in Sweden and Eilertsen & Granados Theater Company from Norway. They sent Rickard/Rebecca and Guro, respectively. At the same time, Susanne visited the Nordic Culture Point in Helsinki in February and participated in the opening of their new residency center on the island of Suomelinna – they will also be future partners in Island Connect. All 3 locations this year also hosted artists from various places in Europe for their pop-up residencies. The last one was held on Åland, where Rickard and Rebecca had invited participants to a gathering under the title Currents of Kinship – here Susanne participated with a large group of artists in investigations of the sea. A continuation of the work started in August at BIRCA, where the group, among other things, participated in a workshop in Tejn with Miller, leader of I vandet. We also went on a trip to energy spots on the southern island with Bodil Egeberg, for dancing with Cathrin Nørlund and on a boat trip with MS Thor.

RECONNECT THE ISLAND – Tyrkiet 19. May - 2. June

This year we made a very special collaboration with the focus on learning more about artists from the SWANA region. We don't know enough about the many artists outside Europe, and it can be difficult to curate artists without knowing more about the specific context they work in. There are security issues for many of the artists, and there are severe VISA problems if you want to invite artists from, for example, the SWANA region. Reconnect is a project run by two Iranians, Nima Deghani and Naghmed Manavi, in collaboration with Giuli Grippo from Spain and The Festival Academy. They have created both an online format and The Island project, where they invite artists to a Turkish island (deliberately unknown for security reasons). This year, BIRCA supported 4 artists to participate: Nadeem Mazen from Palestine, Patricia Habchy from Lebanon, who works with Tuba Emiroglu from Turkey, and finally Lei Am from Iran. Susanne Danig participated in workshops, presentations, and showings. Next year, we will invite Patricia and Tuba for a residency at BIRCA.



BIRCA KIDS RESIDENCY 30. June - 20. July

This year we held 3 weeks of BIRCA Kids. We started with a joint workshop for all participating families on June 11 with Susanne and My Grönholdt (co-curator) Copenhagen. This provided a good introduction to the framework at BIRCA, the idea behind BIRCA Kids, and methods for engaging children.



The second week, Helen Steensbæk Schrøder was our co-host, and we went on several excursions: to the agricultural museum to feed pigs and drive a tractor, to the circus in Soldalen, and to Thomas Hejlesen's Kinohotel to see robot theater before we had a moon ritual with Alaya Riefensthal at the "harachakra" at Rispebjerg. Work was done with kaolin clay, dance instructions were made, and stories were created. Thelma went out to find the elves, and it became a nice little film. Finally, work was done with ghost animals and owls. We had a presentation on July 12 with a visit from Peter Vadim and his father.



The third week was occupied by 3 puppet theater people with Ida Tjalve as co-host. Work was done with music (especially Rita) and a lot of disco dancing (children took turns making playlists in the evenings). Work was done with natural elements in art projects – beautiful butterflies, light effects, sculptures. And Hugo revisited the troll forest, where he had made films and played a little bear as a child. There was also a campfire evening and a visit to the Medieval Center. 

BORNHOLMS CULTURE WEEK

In addition to the presentations by experienced performing artists, this year we had a quite extensive program during Bornholm Culture Week, all supported by and presented in collaboration with Culture Week. We were hit by a major storm along the way and had to cancel and change performances. 6 performances with 19 artists and 3 children on stage were shown, along with a film. In total, 204 audience.

September 16 & 17 - The Sea Hotel, Danish premiere - 29 participants

The Sea Hotel/Havhotellet was created under the Island Connect project, and BIRCA produced the performance, which was first shown on the island of Vis in Croatia in April. The performance was created under the Co-creation format with an original residency on Bornholm in 2024, where artists explored the sea around Bornholm together. It has become a fun and educational immersive performance, which we hope will travel more into the world.

THE CIRCULAR PERFORMANCE ARCHIVE

We have continued working with The Circular Performance Archive (CPA), where knowledge created in artistic research processes at BIRCA is collected. A goal of the archive is to visualize, share, and utilize this knowledge in new ways, which we have truly been able to initiate this year by encouraging artists to use the archive as inspiration. Through the archive, which can be accessed online [here](#), one can gain a deeper understanding of all the artists who have been at BIRCA this year. There are interviews with all artists and insights into themes, considerations, and insights from the processes. In this way, the archive is a significant supplement to this annual report. We hope that the work done at BIRCA will thus gain greater resonance and more visible connections between artists and themes.

SUSTAINABILITY

Since 2022, we have taken a more overarching look at BIRCA's CO2 and environmental footprint. After the Danish Agency for Culture closed its calculator, we have not made concrete calculations of our CO2 footprint. We know that we use almost 2 tons of CO2 to run the house from May to October. Here we optimize with a heat pump system and good waste sorting. Primarily vegan food is served, and local food is purchased – especially from the local regenerative farm Hammersly. We also know that CO2 is used for transportation on the island with artists, and that there is an imprint from our audience, as BIRCA is difficult to reach without a car, but we do not have the right tools or time to measure the concrete footprint.

We know that the absolute most significant part of our footprint comes from artists' travel. We therefore support artists traveling by train/bus/ferry – which sometimes requires increased expenses and time. The

CO2 footprint for ferries is also large, but unavoidable when one is on an island. It is unavoidable that the higher the activity level at BIRCA, and the more international it is, the higher our CO2 footprint.

It is important for us that our forest, which is left completely wild, absorbs about 10 tons of CO2 annually, and that BIRCA's lands provide space for masses of animals, birds, and insects to thrive. Everyone who comes here enjoys meeting butterflies, as well as seeing birds of prey and deer. We provide space for the trees and all living organisms that thrive here.

SAMLEDE TAL OG DATA

In total, 78 adult performing artists with 18 children professionally used BIRCA in 2025 – some of them have been here multiple times. We have absolutely most female artists, namely 58, only 16 men, and 4 queer identifying. In addition, there are 10 guests. Diversity in terms of ethnicity and national spread has not been as great as last year. Just over half are Danish (42), the other 36 have a broad international background, and they came from the following countries: Sweden, Norway, Finland, Poland, Germany, Portugal, France, Spain, Italy, Croatia, England, Canada, Iran, Palestine, Lebanon, Turkey.

In the residency program, we held 6 smaller presentations (including 3 small internal ones for BIRCA Kids) during the season with approx. 46 guests. The small audience groups have increased intensity and intimacy, and it has given people sensory and emotional experiences with room for deeper conversations afterwards. In addition, during Culture Week, 6 performances were shown 12 times, along with a film, with a total of 204 audience members. Finally, approx. 30 to 40 people met the artists in Turkey.

We have not been very active press-wise this year, so there have only been a few mentions in Bornholms Tidende and Dennes Uges Bornholm is primarily mentioned in the calendar. The cluster newspaper is good at writing about us. We send out newsletters regularly and have been active on Facebook, where we have about 1650 followers.

The BIRCA Residency association is led by a board consisting of **Ida Marie Tjalve** (chairperson), **Bente Larsen** (vice-chairperson), **Tine Nygaard**, **Lars Rømer**, **Peter Vadim** and **Jens Frimann Hansen**. **Susanne Danig** is appointed to lead the association's daily operations and is remunerated according to the activities held.

This year, the main house at BIRCA was painted yellow again – and Marta Pala made a painting of it. Niels built another shed. And Susanne started a project of writing an essence of each residency on a stone and placing it around the chestnut tree.
